Mental Health: Our Voice Matters


In English, we have been exploring the evolution of mental health: its treatment and the attitudes towards it. We explored some of the negative connotations behind the word 'mental' and how there are many negative associations (despite the fact that the word literally means 'mind').

As we are currently exploring the contrasts between writer's perspectives from the 19th century to the contemporary, we looked back at Victorian asylums and made some interesting discoveries. Did you know that the word 'asylum' means safe space or refuge? Victorian asylums were very far from this, often incarcerating patients and exposing them to risky and unfounded treatments, such as restraint, isolation and disease? We also discovered that the word 'lunatic' is related to the lunar cycle and that Victorian doctors believed strongly that the moon had cyclical effects on mental health - especially in those with epilepsy. Most shockingly, we were appalled that the word 'hysterical' derives from the noun 'hyster' meaning womb- scientists believed that some of the 'behaviours' associated with women, such as excitedly talking and speaking out against men, were disorders of the mind and directly associated with the reproductive organs of a woman!

Thank goodness we have more awareness of mental health today. Well done to all our Ethos students for contributing maturely to emotive discussions.
